Tallahassee's Love Affair With Camellias

Tallahassee, Leon County, and surrounding counties have hundreds of thousands of camellias growing in our yards and parks.

These slow growing trees with magnificent flowers that bloom for weeks, anywhere from September to March, grow so well here that one would think they were native to Florida, but they are not. Camellias are not even native to the United States.

Camellias originated in China and did not sail across the seas until the 1700s when they were brought to England by the East India Company.

The wealthy merchants and owners of the East India Company requested that specific items be brought to them and that included ornamental camellias. Captain Corner of the East India Company made a round trip from England to China from 1791 to 1792 and brought back two varieties of camellias.

Those two varieties are “Alba Plena” (a white flower that is still very popular) and “Variegata.” In addition to being documented in the ship’s manifest, the two camellias were also illustrated in Andrew’s Botanical Repository in 1792. Camellias made it to the United States in the 1800s and entered the country through our large ports.

In 1811, Robert Gamble is believed to be the first person to bring camellias to Tallahassee. That first camellia was a *Camellia japonica* from a conservatory in Baltimore. The medium red camellia, later named “Aunt Jetty,” was planted at the Camellia Nursery that he owned. Aunt Jetty can still be found all over Tallahassee.

In the 1920s, the Camellia Nursery, later to become the Dorothy B. Oven Park & House, was owned by Robert Gamble’s great-grandson, Breckenridge Gamble and his adopted sons, Ritchie and Bill Rosa.

In 1923, Alfred B. Maclay, a New York financier, purchased property in Tallahassee on Thomasville Road. This property was to be his family’s winter home and he immediately began to create an elaborate garden. Breckenridge Gamble and Alfred B. Maclay were friends who lived only two miles apart on Thomasville Road and shared an interest in camellias.

Because Gamble owned the Camellia Nursery he was able to assist Maclay in acquiring many of the camellias that are now in Maclay Gardens. The camellias at Maclay Gardens came from many different places, including a camellia nursery in Iberia, Louisiana, from a Japanese nurseryman living in the Southeast, and from his international travels.

Two particular camellias still living in Maclay Gardens are a Lady Maclay and a Lady Hume's Blush that are more than 100 years old.

This connection between Dorothy Oven Park and Maclay Gardens is not often known. The two original owners worked on building their gardens at the same time and helped each other acquire camellias. When Gamble's son, Bill Rosa, died his widow, Dorothy, inherited the Camellia Nursery and home. She later wed William J. Oven Jr. and upon her death, in 1985, Mr. Oven carried out his wife's wishes and donated the property to the City of Tallahassee for use as a city park.

The Tallahassee Camellia Society is one of the longest continuously running camellia clubs in the United States.

It started as the Men's Camellia Club of Tallahassee on Jan. 7, 1947 and was a men only club. In the 1940s, raising camellias was an expensive hobby and only wealthy businessmen could afford to purchase the trees. It remained a men only club until 1985 when the name was changed to reflect the ability of members of any gender to join.

However, it was not until 1998 when the Tallahassee Camellia Society elected its first woman president, Mary Maud Sharpe, who is still an active member. While today there are many women who are members of the Tallahassee Camellia Society, there are still a lot of men who are members, and it is common to see married couples actively involved.

Tallahassee Camellia Society members not only grow trees, but they have also register new camellia varieties, including well over 30 new varieties dating back to 1947. While "Aunt Jetty" is probably the most famous variety registered in Tallahassee, several other varieties include: Weelaunee, registered by Richie Ross in 1948; Tallahassee Girl, registered by Richie Ross in 1949; Julia Brock, registered by Paul Brock in 1952; Anne Gramling registered, by R.B. Grambling in 1978; and Roberta Hardison, registered by Dick Hardison in 1992.

Current Tallahassee Camellia Society members such as Randolph Maphis, Maye Walker, and Howard Rhodes have registered new varieties and continue to develop new ones.

The Tallahassee Camellia Society has hosted two Camellia Society National Conventions. The first one was in 1965 and the second one was 50 years later in 2015.

Editor's Column

The Hurricanes of 2018

Hurricanes have always brought about anxiety and excitement in my life from the time I was a boy living about 45 miles from the coast. All hurricanes entering South Carolina seemed to have some affect on my home town of Eutawville, SC. Up to a few days before Florence arrived, all weather charts showed Florence headed toward the Carolinas. Meteorologists, however, on radio and television assured it would make a turn north. It didn't; and hence, our story.

Major General Vincent Coglianes, US Marine Corps, defined the situation concisely that Hurricane Florence ravaged South Carolina and North Carolina and its beaches. Coastal communities included the Marine Corps' Camp LeJeune's major amphibian military training base on the coast of North Carolina, housing thousands of military families. The base itself had \$3.6 billion in damages, which included 800 damaged facilities (500 seriously).

Florence actually landed in the Wilmington area, home of an old and actively growing camellia society that sponsors one of the best societies and best attended camellia shows. I asked Betty Gail Buggeln, who provides regular local articles for Wilmington publications, to provide the article which follows this column. Her husband, Richard, provided photographs of the damages at their home. I also received comments and/or photos from Marty and Diane Clark, Dave Renquist, and Bob Fox. We also received comments and photos from Alex and Jane Hinson of Quincy, Florida, of Hurricane Michael's destructive forces in October.

Wilmington Camellias Survive Hurricane Florence

My love of writing short stories and articles gave me the method that I used to communicate with friends and family about our ordeal with Hurricane Florence – a historic event which brought 23 inches of rain to Wilmington after landing at Wrightsville Beach on Friday, September 14th. Our beautiful coastal city quickly became the “island nation of Wilmington.” Below is the update that I emailed out on September 23, 2018.

WORD FOR THE WEEK: SURREAL: having strange qualities like those of a dream.

Hurricane Florence Update or our personal version of “Gone with the Wind”

Richard and I are very well – alive and safe and cleaning up our house and garden after the destruction of Hurricane Florence last Friday and the weekend. This is the short update. My longer update begins now.

Although Richard and I knew a hurricane was on its way to our North Carolina coast, we decided on Monday, September 10th, to get our house and garden “storm ready” and drive to Raleigh (Tuesday morning) to help Suzanne and our grandchildren while Ben was in Chile on business. We planned to return to Wilmington Wednesday afternoon and then pack for our annual trip to Litchfield Beach, SC, for the A.C.C.S. (camellia) convention. As the weather conditions worsened on Tuesday, Suzanne convinced Richard to stay and protect the Raleigh house and family. In his manner, Richard quickly threw himself into multiple work projects, mostly painting to freshen up various rooms. I stayed busy with my usual tasks – pruning and dusting.

With TV news bulletins, some wonderful calls with Wilmington friends, and daily updates from our COA (Council of Associations) – email and phone, we were all kept informed of the progress of Hurricane Florence and finally its terrible landing at 7:15 A. M. at Wrightsville Beach (1 ½ miles from our house). The 90 mile an hour winds blew the water from our

large pond across from our house into the street, flooding it. Neighbors gave us reports that our house was safe! What great news!

Raleigh was really untouched by this devastating storm. Ben returned home late Friday afternoon. Richard and I wanted to return home soon but flooding and damages caused days of delay. All of us celebrated Suzanne's 38th birthday a bit early (actual date is September 22nd) with a homemade birthday cake made by Ben and Andrew and Emery. We will never forget the special hospitality that the Allaire family gave us during this stressful event. With the help of news updates on the computer and first hand advice from friends returning to their homes in Wilmington, Richard and I finally packed up and left Raleigh, just after 12:00 P.M. on Thursday – exiting at Warsaw, onto Route 24 E to Jacksonville and then State Road 17 back to Wilmington in 4 hours – about twice the time it would normally take.

Now for the SURREAL experience: Richard and I arrived at our house about 5:30 P.M Thursday, September 20th. We thought we had arrived at the Screen Gems studio movie set for a Halloween party or production – multiple trees broken, totally fallen, one on the right front corner of our beautiful house, part of the front gutter was hanging down, branches and debris everywhere! In total nine trees had to be cut and removed from our property. Of course, the cleanup is still continuing this weekend and next week.

Today is Sunday morning, September 23rd and the first time in many days that I have felt “back to normal” in my morning routine. Tomorrow the post office will be open and the library will be open and giant food trucks will arrive with fresh foods for our many grocery stores.

Richard and I are alive. Life is good in Wilmington.

Truly, our lives are good. We only see a great opportunity for improving our garden with many more camellias. In mid-October about a month after the landing of Hurricane Florence, our japonica, *Carter's Sunburst*, bloomed out the prettiest bloom that we had ever had on that plant. This bloom signaled the vitality of our camellia garden.

The removal of so many trees has opened up spaces in the garden that we had previously not considered. None of our camellias

were damaged directly by the hurricane. However, eight camellias were destroyed by falling trees or the bobcat removing trees. At the end of December, we will begin to plant and prune and relocate plants to create a new and better landscape.

Quoting from his excellent article in the December issue of *Our State*, Professor Philip Gerard of the University of North Carolina-Wilmington stated:

“As long as the storm seemed to last, the wake it leaves behind endures ever longer – for weeks, months – in a cacophony of chainsaws, blowers, and roofing hammers. Gargantuan machines scoop roadside mountains of debris into high, slab-sided black trailers, and one truckload at a time, the wreckage disappears. Each day, a little more beauty returns.”

Wilmington Tidewater Camellia Club Hurricane Florence Roundup

While many across the area suffered more severe flood and wind damage from Hurricane Florence making a direct hit on Wrightsville Beach and Wilmington, the club members had their share of challenges. Lou and Ed Powers exercised their best judgment, and left town to stay with their daughter in Greensboro, North Carolina. Flood waters rose to block all roads to Wilmington, and power was out for a week in many locations. Lou and Ed had to wait impatiently to return and found that friends' and neighbors' assurances of little damage to their home was true. Former Tidewater President, Mary Farmer, and current President, Dave (and Mary) Renquist, lost a significant number of trees that served as camellia shade. While Moores Creek Battlefield was inundated with water and closed, the nearby property of Marianne and Ward Grant mainly suffered just tree damage. Nearer to Wilmington, our social chairpersons, E.W. and Gena Fredrickson, lost some 75 trees and at least one large camellia broken off at ground level. This year, lots of folks will be looking for sasanquas and sun-tolerant camellias. Pruning workshops in the spring will be challenged by trying to reshape storm-damaged specimens.

One of the worst and best stories of Hurricane Florence involved the garden of Deb Samos. Deb joined the club after moving into the former Bill and Molly Howell residence. Bill was the local agriculture extension agent and TCC leader and member almost from its inception. The garden was designed with several "rooms" filled with mainly camellias but also remarkable daylilies, azaleas, and other unique plants.

The club benefits annually from Deb allowing us to airlayer our choices from nearly 300 prize camellias. This year we harvested more than two dozen airlayers just after the storm, and witnessed the extensive damage to the gardens from trees falling and closing off the garden rooms. While Deb was assisting her parents in town in recovering from their third house flood in three years, the "tree guy" was nowhere to be found. By putting the word out to airlayer participants, the club gathered a group to help Deb address the damage and open the "rooms." Nate Buffum, aka Paul Bunyan, showed up with his chainsaw to take care of many large trees,

while Sherrie Buffum brought a wheelbarrow and her father to remove debris. Nate carefully cut a fallen live oak off a large camellia and preserved it. He even managed to trick the large live oak trunk to pop back upright and gave this tree a chance to survive. Jim Schiff and Paula Miner, fresh off cleaning up former president Mike (and Marie) Savalli's storm damage, came to help. Likewise, Elizabeth Simmons left the debris from many tree-falls in her yard to clean up Deb's yard. Fortunately, a group of service personnel from nearby Camp Lejeune volunteered to take down and cut up the damaged trees at Elizabeth's, which was just reward for her good deeds. Another former president, Matt Hunter, showed up, bad back and all, to retrieve a couple of camouflaged airlayers we hadn't located, and to help remove debris. Diane and I initiated calling out the volunteers and pitched in where we could. All in all the experience was a great team-building exercise and a good start on garden restoration.

Other Statements and Photos From Hurricanes Florence and Michael

The Cape Fear Botanical Garden's Camellia Garden was totally flooded (some two hundred Camellias). The Cape Fear River and the Cross Creek both overran their banks causing extensive damage to facilities and gardens. We are recovering, thanks in large part to other gardens (St. Louis Botanical Garden, Sarah P. Duke, NC Arboretum) as well as volunteers from NC State University and Wake County Master Gardeners. We have had to prune the Camellias from the bottom to keep them from catching debris and rake out as much as a foot of river debris from beneath each.
