As I write this letter, I am hoping for a break from the record breaking temperatures and the severe drought. In Atlanta, we are 16 inches short on rainfall and have had water restrictions most of the spring and summer. We can only water one day a week from 5 a.m. to 10 a.m. The camellias are looking a little stressed. I hope this drought does not affect bud set and bud growth for the blooming season.

I am really excited about our convention at the beautiful Litchfield Beach and Golf Resort and hope to visit with all of you there. We are planning another "Buck and Bill Show." Remember, the success of the auction depends upon our members bringing plants and other interesting items (and money) for the auction. # **Editor's Column**

Get Ready! 2007-2008 camellia season should be on your mind.

It is an understatement to say we now need to start getting ready for the camellia season by disbudding and gibing when in actuality work is done all year with fertilizing and spraying programs. Nevertheless things must be done starting in August and September to have blooms for the early fall shows beginning with the Georgia National Fair on November 13.

Most camellias have set buds or are setting buds for the upcoming blooming season. Heavily budded plants must be disbudded to produce larger, more symmetrical blooms of better substance. Look at your plants and see clumps and groups of two or three flower buds surrounding one growth bud on each limb terminal with numerous others on tender fragile new growth that could not support a good flower or give it enough free space to open without bruising. Blooms to be enjoyed indoors as cut flowers or blooms that are to be given to friends or entered in shows exhibit much better when bloomed alone at the end of a sturdy branch that provides support.

If yard color is what is desired with only "chance" show blooms, disbudding is desired but not necessary. The winter and spring blooming season in Atlantic Coast and Southeaststates has intermittent ern freezes. The freezes kill buds that have swollen or begun to open, and it provides the argument not to heavily disbud the outside camellias. Should a freeze kill swelling, partially opened buds, tight ones are still on the plant to bloom later.

If it is growing blooms to perfection for exhibiting in your home, giving blooms to friends, or entering shows. Drastic disbudding is necessary especially on limbs that produce the buds you are planning to treat with Gibberellic acid.

Gibberellic acid (gib) was known in the Far East rice growing regions for over 175 years. It caused "crazy" huge growth of rice plants that visibly showed the substance. Its benefits were not evident until the 1900's Gib has been used with camellias for over forty years and is now accepted to blooming manage camellia and to add size and substance to the blooms without adversely affecting the plants. Gib is widely used in agriculture, especially the grape and wine industry. It causes grape bunches to ripen at the same time which makes this industry less labor intensive.

The success of any early camellia show depends upon early gibbing. Although some gibbed blooms of early camellia blooms will open in thirty days, treated blooms usually take 6 to 8 weeks to open. varieties, although gibbed, will not open until their regular blooming time. For these reasons, additional buds should be treated every 5 to 7 days to assure blooms when needed. Growers usually treat two to four or more buds each time (depending on the size and bud production of the plant.)

When gibbing for fall camellia shows search plants carefully for the most mature buds. Usually the first buds gibbed are larger and seem to be more advanced than others. As the season progresses, and the more mature the bud treated with gib, a larger and produced. bloom is better Many growers start early gibbing on bottom branches that are more shaded and probably a degree or two cooler.

Gibbing for the earliest show, Georgia National Fair should have started in August and continued for other early shows and to also enjoy beautiful blooms at home before freezing winter days begin. Gibbing during cold winter months depends upon when and if blooms are needed for special occasions such as weddings family occasions, balls, or show. For example if you help furnish want to "Debutants" for the Camellia Ball the week before Christmas, gib Debutante buds heavily the first two weeks in October

Outdoor growers who want to enjoy many beautiful blooms before freezes would benefit from disbudding and gibbing not only their early blooming varieties but also a few of every variety in the yard. Sometimes s/he has the reward of seeing an elegant beautiful flower in November

that normally blooms in late February.

Use gibberelic acid and disbudding to enhance your seasonal joy of camellias from an all-year effort. Gibbing each bud sounds awesome but it is not overly time consuming and is well worth the time and effort

# **Recipe Corner**

(Please send us your favorite recipes with a short
"Story Behind the Recipe")

This shrimp dip was originated in our family by my paternal grandma, Catherine Foody Hunter. We don't know where she got it or whether she invented it. Grandma didn't use amounts for the ingredients because everything she cooked was "season to taste." New Orleans cooks are like that. The first recipe is hers as recorded by my mother (now a great-grandma in her own right). The changes to the original recipe were mine based on my upbringing and personal tastes growing up in New Orleans. You can make the shrimp dip any way you want and I encourage you to "season to taste." I started making it verbatim by the original recipe and liked it a lot. Then I started tinkering with it. Have it YOUR WAY.

Grandma's Original Version...

# Ingredients:

2 lb. boiled shrimp, peeled, coarsely ground (use crab-boil powder in the pot)
One 8 oz. package of cream cheese, softened
Juice of one lemon
5 green onions, minced
Hot sauce
Salt
Slight sugar
2 hard boiled eggs, chopped
Miracle Whip salad dressing
Worcestershire sauce
Pepper

Instructions: Soften the cream cheese with lemon juice. Add shrimp, eggs, and green onions. Add enough Miracle Whip to make right spreading consistency. Season to taste with hot sauce, Worcestershire sauce, salt, pepper and sugar. Chill at least 8 hours then taste to further adjust the seasonings. (You can extend the recipe by adding more cream cheese, if desired.) 1-½ recipes makes about ½ gallon of dip. (Editor's note: You will need more than ½ gallon.)

### Matt's changes to Grandma's recipe:

My version sort of evolved over time. I don't like uncertainty so first I came up with exact amounts for each of the seasonings, left off the hot sauce (it will be spicy enough believe me!), and added a moderate amount of garlic powder. I have found that using fat free ingredients and Splenda vs. sugar doesn't change the taste at all. Plus, the fat free stuff eliminates the guilt and calories galore. If you don't like the fat free substitutes then keep taking your Crestor! I didn't change the instructions except I use either cream cheese or Miracle Whip to adjust the consistency. It depends on whether I think it is too hard or soft for dipping. NOTE: The only uncertainty in my recipe is adjusting the taste after the 8-hour cure time. Never neglect the 8-hour cure time because the flavors take time in the fridge to blend. Often it comes out a little too spicy so don't be reluctant to dilute it a little bit with Miracle Whip.

## **Revised Ingredients:**

2 lb. boiled shrimp, peeled, coarsely ground (use crab-boil powder in the pot)

TWO 8 oz. packages of FAT FREE cream cheese, softened Juice of one lemon (3 T)

2 green onions, minced

Salt (1 t)
Splenda (1 t)
2 hard boiled eggs, chopped
Miracle Whip FAT FREE salad dressing (1 T)
Worcestershire sauce (1 t)
Pepper (1 t)
Garlic powder (1 t)

If you choose to make either version then don't be surprised when you eventually observe folks skipping dinner to just chow down on your dip. No kidding. I've seen folks lose all shame. They just stand or sit by the shrimp dip and ignore the party, drinks, or any other minor distractions like breathing air. You will know your new version is really good when you taste test after the 8-hour cure time AND YOU REALLY DO NOT WANT TO TAKE THE DIP TO THE PARTY.


