

Gib Now for Fall Shows

Gibbing is easy and almost a MUST for camellia enthusiasts who plan to enter blooms in early camellia shows. Without gib, the early shows would be limited to only the few varieties that bloom in October and November. I remember in the '50s and '60s when shows had a huge Sasanqua section that lasted only a day in order to have enough blooms to put on a show. Excellent growers can make it happen but very seldom will an untreated bloom win over a gibbed bloom in the same category. The gib elongates cells and tends to increase the size of flowers (an advantage) and seems to prolong the life of the bloom; although, the major purpose of using gib is to control time of blooming, for earlier shows, to beat freezing of buds, and to have flowers before petal blight season. Actually controlling blooming time is not an exact science. Opening periods vary with treated buds even on the same plant. For that reason, most growers have abandoned marking leaves with dates because the research there from has not proven beneficial.

In addition to the advantages of using gib listed above, it seems that gib is playing an important part as an enabling agent for highlighting ancient and antique camellias at modern-day shows. So many of the late blooming old varieties would never make it to a show without the gib salts that influence changes and cause them to bloom out of normal season.



Notice in the illustration that a flower bud and a growth (vegetative) bud is at each terminal. Sometimes you must make that happen by disbudding—twisting out all buds except the best bud at the end of the

branch. If the best bud is *near* the end of the branch the short portion of the branch above the bud can be pruned off. If more than one growth bud is present only one would need to be treated. One drop of gib at only one time is sufficient for a good flower. Multiple treatments on different dates have been shown ineffective.

The best applicator delivers one drop. Eye droppers tend to deliver too much liquid and the excess runs out of the cup made from removing the growth bud and will damage buds on the branch down from the bud being treated—a hypodermic needle is recommended. Try to limit the liquid to the area of the growth bud and remember: One drop is enough regardless of how large the "cup."

Most outside growers leave the bud from which they want a flower hanging down. When excess buds are removed, the one hanging down remains. A good thing to do at the time of gibbing is to give the flower a chance to go to a show by using a clothes pin to pin the bud to a sturdy stem or branch to keep it from swaying in any wind and hitting leaves and branches. If the bud faces the ground, it is less damaged by dust, debris and water drops or even a very light frost.

Gibbing once or twice a season is not very effective. To have blooms in a timely manner for shows, gibbing must be done to one or several buds on a plant **each week**— not many because too many blooms opening at the same time will cause smaller flowers. Naturally you will have blooms during weeks you don't go to a show; enjoy those blooms in your home or share them with others.

Giberelic acid is made using a fermentation process and will deteriorate. Keeping the gib refrigerated seems to work well for a season. Gib kept over will still work, somewhat, but loses much of its potency.

The list of early camellias below was compiled by Geary Serpas. Geary identified varieties actually exhibited at the earlier camellia shows. Regardless of the blooming period listed in Nomenclature for the variety, gib will get these varieties ready for even the earliest shows.

I have read articles about gib harming camellia plants but I have seen no proof of any harm during all of the years I have used gib. I don't think the authors of those articles had enough historical statistics at the time of writing. Use gib starting in late August and early September; enjoy the flowers before the cold weather mars them. Gibbed outside camellia blooms are equal to or better than greenhouse blooms at early shows.

Do not expect every gibbed flower to be perfect no more than you would expect every flower opening naturally to be perfect. Some flowers do not open true to shape; some flowers are not naturally colored (reds might have a purplish tint); doubles sometimes do not maintain

central bud and open to show pseudo stamens. Some flowers elongate tube-like and never open, some immature gibbed buds forget to produce key petals, some petals try to unfold at the same time making a strange flower with a beautiful center with tight, incurved outer petals. As many gibbed flowers will bull nose as ungibbed flowers so don't blame bull nosing on gib—blame it on uneven watering procedures and seasonal temperatures.

You don't win shows with gibbing alone. Healthy, robust plants and high humidity during blooming season are musts. Never let your plants become distressed because of lack of water. Always spend the extra dime on fertilizers that contain the minor elements—10-10-10 is good for short season crops like cabbage and broccoli.

The Perfect Camellia: One Woman's Opinion



This camellia variety came from Japan to the United States in 1875 giving proof to its consistency and staying power. As a consequence, it has been known by several different names depending in what part of the world you reside or what era you lived. In Japan, it's called *Hikaru-genji*; in France, *Souvenir d'Henri Guichard*; in America, *Jordan's Pride*; and in Germany, it is called by its most recognizable name which will be revealed later. Through sporting, several new varieties have been registered. You may be familiar with sports, *Colonial Lady*, *Beauty of Holland*, *Quaintance*, *Spring Sonnet*, *The Mikado*, or *Look-Away*.

This camellia doesn't bear a big, gaudy bloom. Being a medium sized semi-double, it is perky and happy looking. It has a delicate and feminine presentation with its crimson streaked pink center and white margined petals. Large petaloids, some folded almost double, intermingle with numerous stamens and golden anthers. It is not afraid to show its frills unlike those loud vibrant blooms such as Frank Houser where bigger is better, but fall flat by the next day. It has staying power and is a good bloom for floral arrangements. It is also constant in its presentation-once you see one you know it is semi double--no second guessing as to whether or not it is single, double or peony.

In warmer weather, it also has a slight fragrance which is always a nice surprise from a winter bloom. The plant is also fairly cold tolerant and the blooms may brown after frost but the plant is usually unhurt. Clean up is fairly simple because this mid to late season blooming camellia is very tidy preferring to drop its blooms whole and not shattering and creating a mess. It propagates easily by scions, air layering or grafting. It is resistant to most diseases and can even grow in direct sun.

What is this camellia with the perfect blooms? Have you guessed, *Herme*? The current nomenclature books and I prefer the name, *Herme*, because it is easy to say, remember and spell. *Herme* is my favorite camellia and according to this woman's opinion, it is the most Perfect Camellia.


