

One nice thing about friendships acquired through the mutual love of Camellias is that they are renewed at each show, and conversation is inexhaustible because, as my husband says, "Camellia lovers are the most loquacious on a *single* subject in the world."

# "The Camellia", "Camellia Japonica" Emblem of Contentment, Domesticity, and Chastity

Camellia is a genus of shrubs of the Tea family. The species are all oriental evergreen shrubs, and have long been cultivated in China and Japan chiefly on account of the singular beauty of their flower. The best known and most esteemed of these is Camellia japonica. In the wild state this plant has red flowers, recalling those of the wild rose, and in cultivation it yields new florists' varieties from seed, and also furnishes a stock on which to graft them. Since its introduction into the western world in 1739, a multitude of beautiful varieties and hybrids have been developed. The plant was given the Latin name, Camellia, by Linnaeus in 1735 in honor of George Joseph Kamel, a Moravian Jesuit, who went to the Pacific in 1688. He contributed to knowledge of the natural history of the region which he visited but, contrary to popular belief, he had nothing to do with the introduction of the Camellia into Europe.

James Petivar, a London apothecary, introduced the camellia to Europeans in 1702 by a publication, illustrations, and descriptions of dried specimens from China. Ten years later Englehart Kaempfer published an illustration with descriptions and a list of varieties.

In 1745 Lord Petre of Essex, England, had camellias flowering in his greenhouse. Two double varieties, "Alba Plena" and "Variegata," were imported into Europe in 1792. As a result many hundreds of camellias

were raised and described in Europe between 1830 and 1860.

It was not until 1800 that Michael Floy came from Devonshire to New York bringing with him an Alba Plena for John Stevens of Hoboken, New Jersey, and in 1797 and 1798 the same John Stevens had imported a single red camellia from England. From this time on both amateurs and professionals became interested. Large numbers of plants were grown for the trade and upwards of 200 varieties were named and introduced by American growers. Camellias came into the South to seaport towns and to various inland points along our river landings, such as Mobile, Ala., New Orleans, La., Charleston, S. C., and ports in Mississippi. On the Pacific Coast camellias were planted first in Sacramento in 1851 by J. J. F. Warren from Boston. The term "japonica" was in common use most of this time and has been replaced by "camellia" only in the last generation.

As Nell Outlaw says in Voiceless Lips, "The flowers seem to say: 'My word to the world is not a heart message. It is more of a heart's yearning, and that yearning is for perfection.'"

As perfect as this lovely flower is, it still doesn't give off a sweet fragrance; but, surely, as we walk along the pathways in the gardens of Heaven, the lovely flower will reach its fulfillment—a fulfillment which will exceed all worldly expectations, for its fragrance beyond compare will fill the heavenly air.

# Cold Hardy Varieties

(From "Carolina Camellias," Vol. XV, No. 3, Fall, 1964)

The question of what varieties to select probably poses the most difficult problem that the beginner has to face. It's not so much a lack of suggestions as it is an over abundance of suggestions. Most growers that the beginner meets are eager to help him by suggesting varieties he "must have". While these varieties may be good for the grower who is doing the suggesting they may not be the best ones for the beginner whose situation and objectives may be entirely different from the experienced grower.

Now that we have that miracle chemical "Gib" the cold resistance of a camellia may not be as important to the experienced grower as it once was but to the beginner the number one requirements of his first selections should be the ability of the variety to perform under adverse cold conditions. Later on when he has more plants and has learned how to use Gib he will be able to select some of the varieties whose blooms are outstanding only if the weather is mild.

#### Cold Hardy Varieties

We must be perfectly honest about the varieties that are most cold hardy and state at the beginning that for the most part they are the varieties that are not as large or full as some of those that usually win Best In Show awards. They are the varieties that have the ability to open in two or three days. The larger and fuller varieties that take a week or two to fully open are usually caught by a sudden freeze. We have to bear in mind that regardless of how cold resistant a bud may be no open or partially open bloom can withstand freezing weather so to produce good blooms during the winter the variety must have the ability to open quickly.

The following varieties will bloom successfully and the buds are usually unhurt in even the more severe winters:



In addition to the others listed there are of course many others that will perform well except in continuously abnormal cold weather. However from this list you should be able to select a half a dozen varieties that will give you the start of a good collection in several different forms and colors. Later as you gain additional experience you can add to your collection some of the marginal performers that have special features that may appeal to you.

For example you may want a Debutante which is a beautiful light pink peony type camellia and one of the all time favorites. Although its blooms and buds are not cold hardy it does bloom early and under average conditions you can count on getting about half of your buds to open before cold weather comes. The same thing applies to that beautiful early bloomer Daikagura. Your personal preference will determine what other varieties you may want that may not perform 100% each year.

#### Look Around You!

#### Choose Varieties That Perform Best

We feel that too many beginners are overcome by the beautiful blooms that they may see at camellia shows and that their want list is often made up of varieties that were grown under glass or other wise protected.

The best advice we can give you is to suggest that you observe which varieties perform best outside in your own home town or in the geographical area where you live. The ones that perform best for your neighbors are the ones that will perform best for you.

#### Basic Fundamentals

There are a few basic things that you should know before you start to buy camellias. One is that some varieties that are not cold hardy as far as the blooms are concerned are vigorous growers and thus nurseries are prone to push the sale of these plants due to this extra size. The second is not to take too seriously the various list of cold hardy varieties that are published from time to time. We recently saw a list of cold hardy varieties that included several whose buds are damaged in just an average winter. (Perhaps there will be some who will say that about our list.)

At any rate don't be discouraged. Go ahead and buy some camellias. Even if you don't have a lot of perfect blooms every year those that you do have in the good years will compensate you for those bad years. And remember this. Even if you never have a bloom you will have a beautiful evergreen shrub that can add to the beauty of your home.

And last, but not least, with the simple use of a little Gib you can have beautiful blooms on most all varieties *before* cold weather comes in the fall so that regardless of what kind of winter we have you will have had a lot of pretty blooms that will make it all worth while.

# **Potato Whitener**

By P. L. HORNE, Columbia, S. C.

Potato whitener is a food item and sold as such by many wholesale food distributors. It is an anti-oxidant processed to keep fresh and prevent discoloration of cut potatoes, cut fruits and leafy vegetable without the use of water. In February 1966 I was preparing some camellia corsages. My flowers were limp due to an unseasonable warm spell. Knowing that potato whitener worked wonders with leafy vegetables, I decided to try it on my camellias hoping they would hold up throughout the evening. After having worn these to the banquet, the ladies were them all the next day. To my surprise and amazement the corsages were still fresh. I experimented with potato whitener during the remainder of the season. I found that the flower would remain fresh for several days after being treated. In the fall of 1966 I gibbed some buds for early flowers to further my experiment and to arrive at the proper amount of potato whitener to use. I treated a Susan Stone for 15 minutes in a solution made of one teaspoon of potato whitener to a quart of water, placed it in a plastic container, refrigerated it for 15 days

and made the head table in the 1966 Fall Show in Columbia.

Having been convinced that potato whitener would keep camellias fresh, I gave some to several camellia growers for further experiment.

We have found that if a flower remains in the solution too long it will discolor and the petals will droop.

This opens up a new approach to exhibiting your camellia blooms. In the past it was necessary to cut a bloom as near show time as possible in order to have a fresh bloom in the show. With potato whitener you can cut your large blooms, treat them and refrigerate them one or two weeks before show time.

To prepare the solution use one level teaspoon of Potato Whitener to one quart of water. Orchid picks stuck in a block of styrofoam makes excellent containers for treatment of blooms. Fill the tube with the solution and place stem of bloom in the tube; leave for 15 minutes, take the bloom out. Place bloom in plastic container and keep in a cool place.


