BUSINESS TERMS

SPECIAL NOTE: No orders to be crated and shipped under ten dollars can be accepted.

PRICES: Prices in this list supersede all former quotations and are subject to change without notice.

PAYMENT: Cash with order except to those of known responsibility. All charge accounts due in 30 days.

CRATING: No charge.

DISCOUNTS: A 10% discount will be allowed on Balled and Burlapped orders picked up at the nursery.

SHIPMENTS: We recommend camellias to be shipped only by Railway Express until transportation conditions definitely improve. We will do our best to make shipments every week. Due to our distance from the railroad, we crate only when we have enough orders to fill our truck. Do not ask for delivery between December 15 and January 1st: Camellias will suffer travelling with the Christmas congestion.

C.O.D. SHIPMENTS: 25% deposit required as guarantee of acceptance on arrival.

DAMAGED SHIPMENTS: The carrier is responsible for any damage in transit. File your claim with them. We will do all we can to help you.

SUBSTITUTIONS: None made unless instructed to do so. Our finest varieties are so scarce and in such demand that we suggest you name second choices in case any you ask for happen to be sold out. This will save much time and correspondence.

GUARANTEE: We guarantee camellias to be well rooted healthy scale-free plants, properly packed and shipped. As we have no control over growing conditions after plants have left the nursery, we cannot guarantee camellias to live—that is entirely up to the knowledge and skill of the purchaser.

PACKING: All camellias are crated Balled and Burlapped.

If your order is not acknowledged promptly, please advise us at once.

NOTICE TO NURSERYMEN: We have not been in business long enough to build up sufficient stocks of fine camellias to sell wholesale. However, we do invite a close comparison of our prices of rare camellias with those of wholesalers. Large orders will be given discounts; write us your needs and we will make you a price.

CALIFORNIANS

Due to your quarantine restrictions, only defoliated camellias can be shipped into California unless you obtain a special permit from the California Department of Agriculture.

GRAFTED PLANTS

Due to some influence in the understock beyond our control, occasionally a heretofore solid color variety will bloom variegated. We guarantee the scion as to variety, but if it blooms true or not is another matter. In every case reported, the variegated form has been far more desirable than the solid one. There are many theories as to this behavior, but we have drawn no conclusions as to the cause.

Our understocks were heavily root pruned before grafting. When you receive one of our grafts you will be sure to have every root which grew the top.

Grafted camellias are graded according to their own merits. A straight stem graft will not be priced the same as a bushy one the same height but will be sold in a lower grade.

MAGNOLIA GARDENS

Magnolia Gardens were made world-famous by its azaleas being seen by the thousands of people who visited every spring—few ever realizing the magnificent camellias they walked by were even growing there—their glory had passed with the coming of the azaleas. Those who really know the Gardens feel that the place should be famous for its camellia collection which so few people see in the winter and early spring.

These camellias were imported by the Reverend John G. Drayton, creator of Magnolia Gardens, during the 1840's from France and Belgium. We have a letter of his written to a fellow minister dated 1858 in which he states "I was afraid the other day that I had been exaggerating when in answer to his inquiries, I told a friend that I supposed their might be some 120 varieties of camellias at Magnolia. So I sat down and summed up the count afterwards and found that number of fine double varieties and how many more, I do not pretend to know—their name seems to be something like legion. Many of the plants are near 10 feet high and as thick as a holly bush—with almost as many flowers as leaves—". Some of these have reached colossal proportions, one double variety now measuring 28 feet in height, 23 feet through, and 16 inches in trunk diameter.

A few of our varieties have been on the market for years, and you will be surprised to find you probably have some of them in your collection.

A CORDIAL INVITATION

is extended to our customers to visit the Garden and Nursery during the camellia season. Besides the magnificent camellias in the Garden, there is the added attraction of a greenhouse full of blooming camellias.

Many customers visit us every year—the trip actually costing them nothing. The ten per cent discount allowed on camellias picked up at the nursery usually more than covers all expenses incurred.

CAMELLIA SLIDES

We have slides of some 160 varieties of camellia in full color which we will be glad to lend Garden Clubs or any other responsible groups. They are the "Bantam" or No. 828 size slides, mounted in the standard 2 x 2 inch mountings which can be shown in most projectors.

It has been brought to our attention that 160 slides are too many to view at one sitting; therefore, we are dividing the collection in two, namely Set A and Set B, with no one variety appearing in both sets. Any club desirous of seeing all our slides will have to choose dates for each set. We will be glad to reserve dates for both sets if the schedule will permit. As we have many more requests that we can schedule, it will be worthwhile to reserve them early to avoid disappointment.

There is no charge for the use of these slides, but we do request that a conscientious and competent operator handle them. It took several years to photograph this collection, so a misplaced slide is a serious loss.

THREE STAR SPECIAL GROUP

Magnolia Queen—This seedling is an enormous white with red strips, an irregular wavy petaled semi-doubled, somewhat variable as to form.

At Magnolia this variety is the last camellia to bloom, usually flowering with the azaleas. Your camellia season can be extended two or three weeks with this camellia.

Well-formed stocky grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Conflagration—A large fiery red semi-double, petals somewhat irregular and waved, with petaloids enclosed by a ring of prominent yellow stamens.

This camellia, a midseason bloomer, will be a winner and source of pride in the finest collection.

Well-formed stocky grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Louise Weick—A strikingly beautiful bright red seedling of ours, formed by a large cluster of delicate petaloids enclosed by a few regular petals. We think this is a seedling from the famous Firebrand.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30", 30-36"

Woodville Red—(Kollock, Martin Roberts) A very large brilliant red, peony type flower. Slender upright grower.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

Lady Charlotte—(Our Seedling) We consider this our most outstanding semi-double of the pinks. A large clear pale pink with prominent stamens and three rows of waved petals veined with white. Even without flowers this variety would be an ornament as growth is tall and symmetrical and foliage is very dark, pointed, and heavily veined. This is one of the hardiest camellias, coming out in perfect bloom last season just after the severest freeze of many years.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

CHARLESTON, S. C.

Mrs. Freeman Weiss—(Our seedling) This flower created a sensation at the 1944 Sand Hills Garden Club Camellia Exhibit where it was seen on exhibition for the first time. It is a semi-double pink of loose construction with wavy petals and petaloids mixed with its stamens. Foliage is light green in color.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

Reticulata—Huge purplish rose flowers, 5 to 7 inches in diameter, blooming late in the season. This variety has probably the largest flowers of any camellia. Not recommended for colder climate unless in greenhouse.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Ville de Nantes—The most talked-about camellia in America today. This flower is probably a Donckelaari sport, having practically the identical foliage, growth habits, and coloring. However, this camellia is more irregular, and has wavy fimbriated petals. Truly a magnificent camellia.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

Lawrence Walker—First offering of this new distinctive seedling from the home of Mr. L. A. Walker in Summerville. A large loose peony red, hemispherical in shape, with stamens. We have seen it bloom three seasons, so can recommend it highly for the finer collections.

3 STAR WHITES

Elizabeth Boardman—(Our seedling) The blooms are enormous hemispherical, semi-double white, fluted construction with golden stamens intermixed. Rounded, light green foliage. Upright growth. This is a hardy free bloomer. Midseason flowering.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Mrs. Charles Simons—A large semi-double white, loose construction with stamens intermixed. Light green, heavily veined foliage. Symmetrical, fast grower. Midseason bloomer. Source: Simons Nursery.

Grafts: 18-24", 24-30"

Lady of the Lake—(Our seedling) Large semi-double white fluted petals, irregular construction. Long narrow curved, dark green foliage. Loose upright grower. Midseason bloomer.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Grandiflora Alba—An enormous white flower, loosely formed with a few stamens intermingled with the petals. Light green glossy foliage. Tall vigorous grower. Not to be confused with Alba Superba.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Imura—Very showy semi-double flower about five to six inches across with large petals. Fast grower with long, narrow, shiny leaves.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

White Queen—(Overlook seedling) A very large semi-double flower sometimes measuring six inches. The petals are pure white, somewhat small and pointed at the tips.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Victory Maid—(An Overlook seedling) Pure white medium size flower; some full double imbricated, others semi-double.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30", 30-36"

Heningham Smith—A sport of Alba Plena which we prefer to both it and Alba Fimbriata. The flower is of pine cone construction with bud in center and shows stamens when fully open. Foliage, growth habits, and blooming time are identical with Alba Plena.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Victory White—Pure white semi-double peony type flower with small petaloids intermixed with yellow stamens in center. Hardy midseason bloomer.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Haku Rakuten—Large semi-double, medium to long narrow overlapping waved petals with showy stamens when full open. Midseason.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

White Empress—A very large semi-double flower, 5-6 inches in diameter. The flower is pure white, but the massing of stamens give it a yellowish glow in the center. Blooms early, usually in December. This is a new variety, not a sport of the well known Empress.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

Mrs. Charles Blard—A midseason large white of loose peony formation. Stamens and petals are irregularly interspersed.

3 STAR PINKS

Eleanor Hagood—(Our seedling) A medium size delicate pale pink, imbricated form. When flower first opens, it is color of Pink Perfection. As its petals gradually unfold, the color becomes lighter and lighter, until the center is almost white. Blooms rather late in season.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Madame de Maintenon—One of our finest original varieties which always seems to miss camellia shows. It is a cup-shaped semi-double with prominent stamens and a light pink color, the particular shade of which we have never seen in any other camellia. A large flower, but does not have to depend on its size to be outstanding in any collection. Large dark green foliage.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Duke of Burgundy—(Our seedling) Medium size semi-double pink with petals fading to white around edge. Stamens intermixed. This flower resembles the Pink Herme in formation, but the shade of pink is somewhat lighter. Small, dark green foliage. Loose upright grower.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Pink Glory—(Finlandia, F.N.) Large semi-double light pink with narrow petals and petaloids mixed with stamens. A good growing plant, blooming in late midseason.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30", 30-36"

Josephine Duell—Semi-double soft pink of loose peony construction. Blooms in late midseason.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30", 30-36"

Smiling Beauty—A delicate shade of pink makes this semi-double a very distinctive flower of medium size. Origin: Overlook.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Mathotiana Rosea—(Rosea Superba) Large double deep pink, opening with rosebud center. It is outstanding for its free blooming habits. Foliage resembles Julia Drayton except more pointed and darker green. Vigorous upright grower. Midseason to late.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24"

Prima Donna—(No. 283 Tea Garden) From the Tea Gardens comes this large open blooming semi-double bright pink with its veined petals. Small dark green foliage.

Own Root: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Rosea Mundi—A wavy petaled irregular semi-double seedling of deep pink color. Some flowers are regular flat semi-doubles, but the majority come irregular.

Grafts: 12-15" to 30-36"

Magnoliaflora—An extremely pale pink semi-double which is a "Must" for every collection. With its delicate blush color and large petals opening about a small group of petaloids, there is no other camellia like it.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Tina Gilliard—One of our seedlings from Derbiana and a great improvement over it. A large semi-double pink with prominent stamens and regularly placed wavy petals. Like its parent, it is a hardy camellia. Midseason.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30", 30-36"

Eleanor McCrady—(Our seedling) Enormous semi-double bright pink, large long waved petals of loose construction. Large light green foliage. This outstanding variety is a midseason, free bloomer and vigorous grower.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Rev. John Bennett—This is one of our finest original varieties. Huge semi-double, true salmon pink with veined petal, occasional petaloids. Narrow, dark green foliage. Loose, upright growth. Midseason to late bloomer. Watch for a spurious variety under the same name.

Own Root: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Rose Mallow—Very large semi-double flower of mallow type. Color soft pink with darker veins. Late bloomer with large round leaves.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

Fimbriata Superba—Semi-double deep red with deeply serrated petals. Said to be a sport of Tricolor Seiboldi, this variety has been known to revert back to its parent. Our stock came from England via Oregon and has to date bloomed true.

3 STAR REDS

Marion Mitchell—(Our seedling) This is our finest scarlet red seedling which has won favor with discerning collectors everywhere. It is a large late blooming semi-double with fragile petaloids mixed among the stamens. This plant for four years has been one of our best sellers.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Henry Middleton—Large semi-double dark red, 3-4 rows of large petals. Prominent stamens in center. Large glossy dark green foliage. Symmetrical upright grower. Midseason bloomer.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Robert E. Lee—(Our seedling) For those who want an extremely dark red, this is the camellia. In midseason it opens almost black buds into glowing dark irregular loose semi-double flowers. The veins in the petals are even darker in color. Stamens are red with usually a few petaloids showing. It has bloomed well outside every year since it was discovered four years ago and can be considered a freeze proof flower and a good grower.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Firebrand—An original Magnolia Garden variety. A large fiery red which blooms in January when many camellias are injured by cold. This beautiful semi-double is further enhanced by white veins on its occasional petaloids. Firebrand is an ideal camellia for those who have trouble blooming camellias out of doors in the coldest part of the winter.

Grafts: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30", 30-36"

J. J. Pringle Smith—One of the largest of the late season reds, flowers being full five inches in diameter. It is a semi-double regularly formed and quite cold resistant. Large glossy foliage.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Tiara—(Our seedling) This is a very unusual camellia in both color and form; an orange red which opens as an imbricated with a long pointed bud in the center and later becomes a regular semi-double. Petals are rounded in shape. We have seen no other camellia of its type.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Mrs. Charles Cobb—(Our seedling) Large semi-double dark (almost black) red with rich golden stamens intermixed in petals. Large, rounded, light green foliage. Symmetrical upright grower. Midseason.

Own Root: 15-18", 18-24", 24-30"

Campbell Ashley—A loosely formed semi-double deep red with petals of crepe-like texture. Petaloids intermingled with stamens. One of the finest reds to come on the market in recent years. Origin: Middleton Place.

Emperor of Russia—A very large double peony form flower. Dark crimson red in color.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Duncan Bell—(Mena Ladinier) Large beautiful orange red with flat outer petals and numerous irregularly arranged small petals in the center.

Grafts: 24-30", 30-36"

Glen 40 (Alabama)—Full double flat imbricated flower, brilliant red in color. One of the larger rose form camellias. Shows stamens when fully open. Slow grower.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

James Allan—Huge semi-double flat fiery red with prominent stamens and occasional petaloid. A seedling from the Walter Allan Nursery in Summerville.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Dr. Shepherd—(Te Deum, Firegold) A Tea Garden variety named after its founder. This flower is a huge semi-double loose peony dark velvety red with many stamens. Rounded dark green foliage, late bloomer. The parent plants are marbled with white, but all our grafts continue to be solid red.

3 STAR VARIEGATED

Marion Mitchell, Variegated—We were so well pleased with this variety as a solid red that we were quite overwhelmed when through grafting it came out heavily variegated. Those who know the solid form will certainly want this improved strain.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

Pink Glory, Variegated—This is the variegated form of the genuine Pink Glory (Finlandia, F. N.). Our scions were taken from a plant whose flowers come half white.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Lady Mary Cromartie, Variegated—(La Reine, Var.) The variegated form of the well known pink. This is a large semi-double deep rose pink and white, loose construction, stamens intermixed in petals. Large, light green foliage. Early midseason bloomer.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Adolphe Audusson, Variegated—A very large semi-double deep red marbled with white. Prominent stamens irregularly arranged among the heavy broad petals. Large deep green foliage. Mid-season bloomer.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18"

Dearie Mealing—A seedling found in Magnolia in 1941. Due to propagation difficulties, we have not been able to offer it until now. A flat white heavily marked with pink, with compact cluster of stamens and petaloids in center. Those who have seen this flower praise it highly.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Donckelaari—Large semi-double red, marbled white with conspicuous golden stamens in the center. Large, narrow, dark green foliage. Slow grower and very difficult to propagate. Free bloomer, beginning in January continuing through March. We consider this variety one of the best in its class.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Eugene Lize—(Lady Jane Gray) A semi-double to loose peony rich cherry red marbled white. Foliage and growing habits resembles the Donckelaari. Midseason bloomer.

Grafts: 12-15", 15-18", 18-24"

Margaret Walker—Very large semi-double white striped rose pink, loose waved petals with a few stamens intermingled in the center. Narrow dark green foliage. Slow upright grower. Midseason to late bloomer.
